# Fire in Australia


We've always lived with it but now it's faster and more ferocious and shows no mercy...





# **Emergency Responses**

- Victorian experience
- Cyclones → flood → fire → drought
- Prepare, Respond, Recover
- This is about recovery because we hadn't done the first 2 and we should have!!
- Since the terrible fires of the last 10 years, emergency responses have become more organised but Landcare has lost its place in the process – this is a story of how we have re-established our role in disaster management.





# Impact on assets

- 4570 hectare fire zone
- 91 landowners affected across Scotsburn, Clarendon, Durham Lead
- 12 houses destroyed
- 74 outbuildings lost, fencing, machinery
- 55 water tanks affected
- 4136 animals destroyed
- 153ha of grazing pasture land lost
- 10ha hardwood plantation lost

Fortunately NO LIVES LOST

- Pastures
- Pest Animals

# Advocate for all the issues

## **Natural Environment**

- Initially focussed on public land fire line, private land fire line, animal welfare, cultural heritage, flora and fauna EPBC, waterways and roadside vegetation
- NO provision for PRIVATE LAND rehabilitation or risks
- Leigh Catchment Group had to request representation via CMA
- Subsequent addition of Landcare and environmental projects to actions



# Advocate for all the issues

## **Economic Environment**

- Leigh Catchment Group gained representation
- Weeds sit here not in the Natural Environment subcommittee!
- Only Weeds of National Significance e.g. Serrated Tussock
- Subsequent addition of potential impacts of weed infestation on private land



# What Landcare has to offer

- Initial support for communities
- Clear understanding of the impact to local natural environment
- A point of contact for the Recovery team
- Coordinated approach to extension
- Conduit and buffer between agency staff and the community for property access



# What you need

- Good relationships with your local agencies
- An understanding of the Emergency Response in your state
- An action plan for immediate response post disaster
- Identified key people with the capacity to represent Landcare/natural environment on response subcommittees
- Ability to assess the damage and prepare risk/loss statements
- RESERVE FUNDS for immediate support (CMA???)





# **The Benefits**

- Your priorities are tabled in the overall Recovery Plan
- You have an established and recognised plan for action
- The Recovery process will take years so you will be pulling together projects and funding applications for years
- Get it right and you will get funding
- •Get it right and you can make a difference.





# The Result

September, 2, 2016

Minister for Emergency Services James Merlino today announced the Labor Government will provide \$624,000 to the Corangamite Catchment Management Authority to restore and revegetate bushfire affected areas.


The CCMA will work alongside the community and farmers to deliver this.
